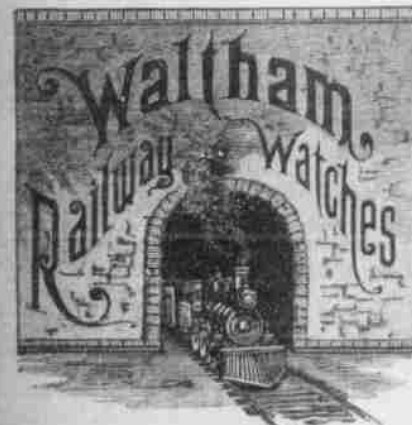

CATHOLIC'S ARE INDIGNANT

Schuylkill County Churches Resent a Change of Authority. It was announced several weeks ago in the columns of the HERALD that the divisions in the Catholic diocese of this state would, in the near future, undergo a decided change, as a result of the formation of a new diocese, the headquarters of which would be fixed at Altoona.

The statement, though denied, was found to be substantially true, and had the effect of causing considerable disturbance among priests and laity in the parishes of this county.

As a result of the sudden announcement of their annexation to the Harrisburg diocese, the priests of Schuylkill county, to the number of thirty-six, met in convention last week and sent a committee to the Abiegale, Archbishop Martinelli, to lay before him the case of the diocese.
