

He scored Mr. Bryan and generally ridiculed the alleged false prophesies of the Demo-crats in 1896. Mr. Dearmond (Mo.) warned the western Republicans that they could not deceive their constituents in the coming congressional elections by claiming that they had yielded to the wisdom of their col-leagues in caucus. Mr. Overstreet (Ind.) opened the debate in support of the bill and Mr. Maddox (Ga.) replied the bill and Mr. Maddox (Ga.) replied to him. Mr. McClellan (N. Y.) announced his opposition to the bill on the ground that it would contract the currency, extinguish the bank notes and enhance the value of gold bonds.
