

Criticises the Administration of President McKinley.

DECLARES THE RULES IGNORED.

The failure to extend the system where practicable has been as patent as the failure to sustain it.

was passed with a deliberate rejection of the copelitive system, after a de-bate. It charges that in the treasury deportment appointments are made first and examinations are held afteryard, and that those who fail are kept

The report on the scope of Presilent McKinley's order of May 29 last n part was as follows:

"The present review deals with the ope of President McKinley on May as apparent over six months of acive operation, and its results, as in-licated by the present condition of the ervice. In order to appreciate the ignificance of the president's action, must be remembered that the Republean party came into power in the fall of 1897, pledged by its platform to susain the civil service law and rules, to mforce them thoroughly and honestly and to extend their application wherever practicable, and that Mr. Mc Kinley, in accepting the nomination of his party for the presidency, indersed and reaffirmed these pledges, declarng that 'no backward step' would be

"The principal test of the McKinley dministration to uphold the civil ser vice law came naturally in connection lassified. The original classification of 1883 embraced 13,924 places. On these Mr. Cleveland, during his first term, added 1,939. During the admin-istration of President Harrison the rules were further applied to 19,973 po sitions. During the second Cleveland term there were added 36,705, making a total to that date of 32,997 to be credited to Republican administrations. and 38,644 to be credited to Democratic
