The total cash receipts (county funds) during the year was \$454,482.91, divided up as follows; From taxes 1858 and previous years, \$128,756.85, from redemption taxes and Com-missioners sales, \$1.484.19, from missel-laments sources, licenses, 50., \$58,896.89 in-come outside of 1899 taxes, \$188,989.89, re-crived from taxes of 1899, 240,983.58; total revenue, \$429,064 46; cash on hand January 1, 1899, \$25,428 45.
