CONSERVATIVE MINERS WIN.

The New Year Will Not Open With a Miners' Strike. Altoona, Pa., Dec. 28.—In the historic coal fields of northern Pennsylvania and Clearfield counties yesterday several mass meetings of miners were held, the object of which was to create sentiment in favor of higher wages.

The meetings at Barnesboro, Hastings and smaller places were well attended, but orderly and quiet. Addresses were made, but the tenor of the remarks was conservative and cautioned against strikes.

CONGRESSMAN BOUTELLE'S ILLNESS.

His Condition Far More Critical Than Has Been Admitted. New York, Dec. 28.—A special from Bangor news: The report comes from a trustworthy Portland man who talked with a physician acquainted with the case, that Congressman Boutelle is suffering from Bright's disease in its last stages, and that the violent attacks, bordering on delirium, which he has experienced in the last few days have been caused by uraemic poisoning, which results in convulsions, resembling symptoms of insanity.

While the utmost secrecy has been maintained ever since Congressman Boutelle's return to his home concerning his real condition, it has become known, though various sources, that his case is far more critical than has been admitted by the doctors or members of the family.
