JURORS FOR HAINS

Rapid Work Filling Box at Murder Trial.

PRISONER SURE OF ACQUITTAL

His Brother and Father by His Side In Court, but His Mother Is Ill With Strain and Anxiety.

New York, Dec. 15 .- With six jurors in the box and a fresh panel of 100 talesmen present, the preliminaries to the trial of Thornton Jenkins Hains. short story writer, were continued today before Justice Crane in the supreme court at Flushing on the charge of being an accessory to the murder of William E. Annis, editor. who was shot and killed by Captain Peter Hains, Jr., the author's brother. at the Bayside Yacht club.

Hains declared that he was confi dent of a speedy acquittal. He looked cheerful, although pale from long confinement. He wore a new gray pad dock overcoat over a dark suit of clothes, a brown soft hat and a black

A few minutes after the prisoner entrance he was joined by his brother. Major John Hains, a trim and soldierly looking little man with sparse, reddish hair, who were a long brown ulster buttoned up to the neck. The major later took off his top coat and seated himself just behind and a little to the left of Thornton.

Another relative of the defendant is court was Robert P. Hains, an uncle. who is a jutert lawyer in Boston and who, like his nephew, was once a cadet at Aunapolis.

The prisoner's aged mother did not appear with the others. It was explained that she had become III from strain and auxiety and would stay at a hotel in Flushing until she fell able to endure the ordeal,

General Peter Hains, father of the prisoner, short, sturdy and square built despite his age and his gray hair, strode in with a soldierly throwing back of his shoulders and took the chair next to T. Jenkins Hains.

Witnesses for the prosecution in court were Charles Roberts, who saw the shooting; H. G. Rockwell, a friend of Annis and an eyewitness of the killing; Charles Birchfield, another witness of the shooting; Dr. Horace O. Halpin, who was called to attend Annis after the shooting; Dr. L. H. Schumack, surgeon of Flushing hospital when Annis died.

Dr. Walter Frey, who performed the autopsy: Patrolman Charles Baker, who placed the Hains brothers under arrest, and William Harway, who was in the catboat Pam when Captain Hains shot and killed Annis. also were present.

Page and Charles Sprague Smith, director of the People's institute, all of New York city.

RUSSIAN MINISTER DIES.

Nicholas Muravieff Seized With Apo

plexy on Corso at Rome. Rome, Dec. 15.-Nicholas V. Muravieff, Russian ambassador to Italy, was seized with apoplexy while walk ing on the Corso.

He died shortly afterward in z hote to which he was carried. Nicholas Muravieff was appointed

ambassador to Italy in February, 1905. Prior to this he had held the portfolio of minister of justice. His brother, Count Muravieff, died suddenly in 1900 when minister of foreign affairs. He was formerly secretary of state at St. Petersburg and in 1892 was ap-

pointed president of the criminal section of the senate, which is the highest court in Russia. On Jan. 1, 1894. he was appointed minister of justice. and under his direction the judicial reform of the governments of Astrakhan and Archangel as well as of Siberia was carried through. In August, 1903, Emperor Nicholas

appointed M. Muravieff arbitrator at The Hague of the cases between Venezuela and the blockading powers, and in October of the same year he was made president of the Venezuelan tri-

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Lesson XII. - Fourth Quarter, For Dec. 20, 1908.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Luke ii, 8-20. Memory Verses, 8-10-Golden Text, Luke ii, 11-Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

[Copyright, 1908, by American Press Association.] From the time when Adam and Eve listened to the devil rather than to God and by one man sin entered into the world and death by sin (Rom. v, 12) the god of this world, the devil, has been blinding people's eyes to the truth and to the love of God, always setting before them some way which he insists is better than God's way; hence all the sin of which we read in all the Bible story and in the whole history of the race. The alternate lesson for today tells how even Solomon, so beloved and blessed of God, was turned away from Him by the women of other nations, and by them and their idols his heart was turned away from the Lord God of Israel (I Kings xi, 4-13; Neh. xiii, 26).

In all the history of the world there has never been but one who always resisted the devil and listened only to God, and of Him we learn as to the beginning of His humanity in our lesson today. He was with the Father before the world was. By Him and for Him were all things created. He appeared in human form to Abraham. to Joshua, to Gideon, to Manoah and his wife and to others. He was typified in every sacrifice appointed by God from the shedding of blood in Eden by His own hand to provide redemption clothing for Adam and Eve all the way down to Golgotha. He was set apart before the foundation of the world, but was manifested in the fullness of time, made of a woman, made under the law, to redeem them that were under the law (I Pet. i, 20; Gal. Iv. 4, 5).

Moses and all the prophets wrote of Him as the only Redeemer, the Messinh of Israel, the one to rule the world in peace and righteousness (Luke xxiv, 27, 44). From the days of Malachi, who said, "The Lord whom ye seek shall suddenly come to His temple" and "Behold I will send you Elijah the prophet before the coming of the great and dreadful day of the Lord" (ili, 1; lv, 5), there had been no further message from heaven for over 300 years. But one day while a certain priest was officiating before God in the temple an angel appeared to him and said that through him and his wife the herald of the Messiah should come, who would go before Him in the spirit and power of Elijah.

Six months later the same angel, Gabriel, was sent from heaven to a humble home in Nazareth to a virgin called Mary with the most wonderful message ever given to a woman in the whole history of this world (Luke 1. 30. 33). In simple, childlike faith Mary listened to the wonderful message and said, "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word." It had been foretold that the Messiah should be born of a virgin and thus the word of God be literally fulfilled that He should be the "seed of woman;" also that He should be born in Rethlehem of J Gen. iii, 15; Mic. v, 2). In our lesson we see God, who watches over His word to perform it (Jer. i, 12, R. V.), bringing all things to pass just as He had said. A decree from the world ruler, who knew not God, caused Mary to be in Bethlehem at this particular time, and while there she brought forth her firstborn son in a lowly place among cattle and used a manger as His cradle (verses 7, 12, 16), for there was no room for them in the inn. He came from the glory of heaven. His Father's home, the holy angels and the great company of the redeemed, and there was no welcome for Him on earth except from His mother and Joseph, and those few shepherds, and Simeon and Anna, and those wise men from the east, and a few others. But all heaven was interested. An angel came with his glory of heavenly light and told these shepherds of the great event; then a multitude of angels praised God in these words: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men" (verse 14). Then the angels returned to heaven, and the shepherds went and found it just as the

angels had said. To this day how little interest is taken on the earth in heavenly things, the god of this world leading his followers to cry, "Let us alone," but God has always held a few like the shepherds and the others, whose hearts are with Him by His grace. Notwithstanding all hindrances, the child who was born of Mary shall yet reign over the house of Jacob and over all the earth in righteousness, and His church shall reign with Him. Note the angel's "fear nots" (l, 13, 30; ll, 10) to the Lord's people and study the words from Gen. Danville, Ky., Dec. 15 .- Elmer Hill. xv, 1, to Rev. i, 17, and if a child of God give a spirit of fear (II Tim. i, 7). The good tidings of great joy are for all people, but what a large proportion of the human race have passed away and

good news. "Is it nothing to you?" In all His life He glorified God, and by His finished work He gives peace to all who receive Him. The shepherds did not question the angel's message, but "Let us go and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known to us."
