A letter has been sent to supervisors directing them to select negroes so far as competent ones are available to count the negroes in those cuumeration districts in which two-tifths or more of the population consists of ne-

Director Durand also tells supervisors that he does not consider it advisable that in the south negroes should enumerate white families and that therefore it will be necessary in many enumeration districts to appoint both a white and a negro enumerator.
