These countrymen of Columbus are quite different from the men of southern Italy. We do not have so many of them as we do of the sons of Sicily and the south. These are the men of the Piedmont, who have mixed their blood with the French. and the Lombards, whose fair hair shows the Germanic strain. I found them gentle mannered, enterprising, patriotic, and above all, democratic. Perhaps this is one of all great mercantile cities and Genoa is emphatically a great commercial center.
