KLAUSNER CLAIMS DAMAGES FOR FALSE ARREST AT EQUI-NUNK-SETTLEMENT IN JUS-TICE KORDMAN'S COURT WAS UNDER PROTEST- TROUBLE STARTED OVER RENTAL OF COTTAGE.

J. P. Klausner vs. Frank DeBruen. Trespass for mallcious prosecution; \$20,000.

May, Plaintiff alleges that in 1910, he rented of F. M. DeBruen a cottage at a lake owned by De Bruens, near Equinunk. No written loune was executed by the parties, but by parole agreement the rental was fixed at \$100 for the season. Klausner and his family took possession of the cottage about June 1. About June 15 plaintiff was rendered a bill for \$40 for rent and other items due at that time. Payment was by check upon the Loan Exchange bank of New York. Klausner then went to New York on business and upon his arrival there was advised by a wire from his wife that Frank DeBruen had instituted dispossess proceedings in order to put her out of the cottage. Klausner immediately stopped payment on the \$40 check, as he had o a right to do any time before payment of same, and wrote one of the DeBruen brothers, advising him of the part and offering to pay for the

entire season in advance Plaintiff then went to Equinunk to be present at the hearing, which had been set for the dispossessal proceedings for June 23 before Justice of the Peace Charles A. Kordman. Upon his arrival there he was arrested upon the complaint of Frank De Breun, on the charge of issuing a fraudulent check. Upon the advice of the justice, and to avoid the humiliation of being taken to the county jail, Klausner settled the matter, but he did so under protest. ternoon. Some of the members from Honesdale and White Mills arrived at best. West Hawley on the 3 o'clock train. Rev. J. B. Cody, the president of the

association, said: "Come on, boys, let's get off here at this station."

After the meeting adjourned Mr. Martin took all the men over his up-to-date poultry farm. One building is 200 feet long. It contains 1200 birds. Another building, 130 feet long, contains 300 birds. He is now erecting a building 30x80 to he used as a fireless brooder house, with a room for wagons and some horse stalls.

Mr. Martin is to be congratulated on his hospitality toward the members of the association.

"Why, he started for Roy Sands' poultry farm."

All started after him, occasionally finding a goose feather along the trail, and before they reached the poultry farm Cody and the goose were found and both partook of the same beverage. 
