Dr. McFarlane's subject was "The Distribution of Geography Through the Grades." Remember that Geography isn't contained in text books; they have only a skeleton outline, and a certain body of facts. We must show the cause which lies be-hind the fact. So large a per cent. of children leave school at the end of the fifth or sixth year that we must really cover the subject in elementary work or these children will be ignorant of a greater part of the world. There are certain cities, rivers and mountain ranges which are so important as to have a controlling in-fluence.
