TENER CAUSES ARREST OF ANOTHER EDITOR.

Reninger and the warrant was at once issued and placed in the hands of Constable Albert Steckel and Court Tipstaff Francis S. Mertz, who took the next trolley car for Slatington and arrested Sell.

gation of prejudice; especially so if the allegation were denied. But the Commonwealth only takes issue with the accused on the averment of a combination against him. As to the question of widely extensive prejudice, while not in terms admitting it, the district attorney says he is unable to deny it; and he does not, as in the case of the other reason, demand proof. Inasmuch as either one is sufficient, this dispenses with the necessity of further proof. The petition will be granted where it sets forth a statutory cause and such allegation is not denied: Com. vs. Coyte, 3 York, 171.
