**NECROLOGY.**

**Death of William Lewis.**

William Lewis died at his home on Tryon street on Tuesday night, aged forty-eight years. He is survived by his wife and three sons, Ronald, Basil and Thomas; his mother and two sisters, Mrs. John Kilgallon and Mrs. Peter Campbell, of New York City. The funeral services will be held Friday morning at 10 o'clock from St. John's church. Interment will be in St. John's cemetery.

**Death of Prof. John M. Dolph.**

Prof. John M. Dolph, superintendent of the Port Jervis public schools, died at his home, in that city, Monday evening from septicaemia. He was one of the oldest and leading educators in Southern New York, and was born in Havana, Schuyler county, October 18, 1845. In 1878, Prof. Dolph was called to the superintendency of the graded schools of Honesdale. He remained there until 1884, when he was recalled to Port Jervis to be superintendent of schools.

In 1884, Prof. Dolph provided a plant list of northeastern Pennsylvania for the geological survey of that state as part of his work in Honesdale. He had been active in geological work and discovered a new trilobite in the trilobite ledge of the lower Heiderberg group, back of the Mountain House, which is described as the "Dalmanites Dolphi" in the report of the State Geologist in 1892.

**STATE COLLEGE.**

Special to THE CITIZEN. State College, Pa., December 26.—Saturday marked the close of the fifth annual session of Farmers Week at the Pennsylvania State College. The session showed a marked increase in the number of farmers who attended the lectures over former years. In all about 500 farmers from 56 counties of the state were present. The county having the highest number of representatives in attendance was Washington and next in order came Bradford.

There were over one hundred lectures on different phases of the agricultural problems and four lectures going on each hour in as many different rooms of the Agricultural and Dairy Building. Of special interest to those interested in fruit culture was the display of apples, dressed, poultry and eggs in one of the rooms of the Agricultural Building. It showed the good fruit which the farmers of "Penn state" can produce and showed the interest taken by each in seeing who could raise the "best." No prizes were offered, but in the corn exhibition, in the room adjoining, there were prizes offered for the best specimens of the varieties on exhibition. The first prize for the best Yellow Dent went to Pusey Cloud, Kennett Square; second: Bayard Bros., Wyalusing; White Dent: E. G. Cloud and Bro.; Kennett Square; second: Samuel Faust, Obolisk, Pa. Flint corn: J. W. Moore, Bethlehem; second: Harry Rockell, Clinton. White Cap Dent: J. A. Beck, White Deer; second: J. B. McFry, State College.

The grand sweepstakes went to Pusey Cloud and the Grand Champion Ear prize was won by Bayard Bros., Wyalusing.

Although there was some very nice corn shown.

Each evening at 8 o'clock there would be a speech or lecture on some subject, many of them illustrated with lantern slides. Of great interest to all was the lecture by Prof. T. J. Mairs on the "Correspondence Courses and Methods of Conducting" which began in a rather small way over two years ago with only a few enrolled and growing to what it has to-day, with an enrollment of 3000 and employing several clerks to examine and grade lessons, etc.

He showed in plain, concise manner how a farmer or any one could increase his knowledge of agriculture by taking a course and studying at odd or spare hours, it not being necessary to interfere with other work. No tuition is necessary, the student only having to buy textbooks and examination papers.

Some interesting subjects on Saturday were "Growing Wheat," S. L. Faust; "Irrigation of Vegetables," Prof. Watt; "Plant Breeding," J. B. Hill and "Dairy Barn Construction," Prof. Van Norman. The last included a talk on the up-to-date methods of sanitation and ventilation which are so often neglected in putting up barns. Also many little conveniences were pointed out to be kept in mind in planning the structure so as to be handy. This lecture was in the Dairy Building and was followed by an "Ice cream" lecture by Prof. Van Norman and an "Ice Cream Demonstration" by F. P. Knoll. After hearing the classification of the various frozen dishes and the formulas for their successful manufacture, the visitors repaired to the creamery laboratory where Mr. Knoll demonstrated the actual process of making the product, from the mixing of the cream and flavor, freezing, to packing in cans, preparatory to shipment or for local consumption. After freezing the cream, the visitors were each given a fair sample to see the good results produced by mixing the salt and ice in the right proportions for the freezing, mixture and adding the right amount of flavor to the cream, etc.

Saturday forenoon marked the conclusion of the successful week and most of the farmers departed for their homes to get there in time to spend Xmas, while a few preferred to spend the coming day in town with friends, to sample the hospitality and also to taste the roast turkey of State College.
