"The best treatment of peach trees is to remove the worms or borers around them just as soon as possible. and mound the soil around them to a height of about one-half foot. I would trim now rather than wait until spring, but for fall pruning I would not cut the stubs quite as short as in spring pruning. Then go over them in the spring again and shorten up the stubs by cutting them off; if you cut them short by fall pruning, be sure they are painted with the white lead and oil paint. 
