ISSUES A STATEMENT. DIX

Insurgents and Regulars Get Together to End Deadlock at Albany-Call For Meeting Follows Attempt of Governor to Obtain Harmony.

Albany, N. Y., Feb. 8.-A Democratic conference on the senatorial question. including both regulars and insurgents, is being held in the assembly parlor today.

At once rumors flew about the capitol that sufficient insurgents to elect William F. Sheehan to the senate had been won over by Murphy. While shere was some doubt about that, the conference was looked on with the greatest significance, and the call was a full confirmation of the statement made during the past three days.

It was at first supposed that Murphy had induced Governor Dix to come out in open advocacy of the claims of Mr Sheehan, but it was impossible to verwas considered likely that a break in the insurgent ranks has come and that in the conference some one of the men who have long held out will make an announcement of a change in post

Governor Dix made a formal state ment in which he said that he not only hoped, but expected, that' the confer ence would result in the solution of the senatorial problem. He gave out this formal statement after having consulted many insurgents and after having asked some to attend the conference

"It is incumbent upon the legislature to discharge the constitutional duty of maming a United States senator, and I am pleased with the proposition for a conference of the Democratic sena-tors and assemblymen. I hope and expect that the conference will have results satisfactory to the people of the state and the party."


#### New Jersey Governor Threatens State Chairman if Bills Are Blocked.


