A bill has been introduced in the legislature at Harrisburg, providing that all county officers shall be paid a salary, and that all fees collected by them shall be turned over to the county or state. The scale of salar-ies is fixed for counties having less than 25,000, between 25,000 and 50,000, and thence by each 25,000 up to 150,000. These salaries are to remain fixed until changed by act of assembly and to take effect on expiration of terms of present incumbents of county offices. In counties where one person holds the office of prothonotary and clerk of courts or of recorder of deeds and register of wills he is to receive the salary for recorder or prothonotary and \$1,000 additional. If the bill is made a law it will mean a saving of thousands of dollars each year to the various counties affected, in-


