HER BUSINESS IS CLEANING TOWNS

Kalamazoo Woman Is First Public Housekeeper.

ACCOMPLISHES BIG RESULTS.

The Rev. Caroline Bartlett Crane Made Kalamazoo, Mich., a Spotless Town and Started Improvements in Many Other Places on Contract.

The Rev. Caroline Bartlett Crane of Kalamazoo, Mich., has the distinction of being the first public housekeeper in the world, says Hampton's Magazine.

She told the recent conservation congress in St. Paul of the simple, plain, but time tested housekeeping methods that under her direction have been applied in a number of cities and of the excellent results which had followed.

Some time ago the ideal of public service grew so strong in her heart that Mrs. Crane resigned her pastorate and devoted her entire time to civic work. She organized the Women's Civic Improvement league and started out to clean up Kalamazoo, which sadly needed cleaning at that time.

Watching the fights of Grahame White in Boston recently was what turned Moran's mind to aviation. He became immensely interested and determined to take an upward trip some time himself.

Having made Kalamazoo into the "spotless town" of the northwest, Mrs. Crane continued, by means of writing and lecturing, to preach the gospel of civic cleanliness and order.

The most valuable part of Mrs. Crane's work is that it has proved in almost every case permanent. Her visit and inspection are followed by organization of effort to bring about the changes suggested by her.
