laid hatched out into a larva and the larva went tumbling out of the tree and dug into the ground. For a great number of years the larva lived at the bottom of that tree trunk and although its life was not what one would call fascinating it kept on living by sucking nourish-ment out of the roots of the tree until one day it woke up and lo it was a pupa.

Now the pupa, that is simply an immature cicada, which is a straw colored insect with red eyes and the usual collection of wobbly antennae, kept on growing up and getting nourishment in the same manner. The specimen they had at that meeting was a pupa which was found two weeks ago by Harry Barber, a member of the society, in a greenhouse that was put up about seventeen years ago.
