#### THE CONGRESSIONAL SITUATION.

Elsewhere in this issue will be found a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee of the Republican party in Wayne county, together with copies of the resolutions adopted by the committee naming congressional conferees and directing them to support Homer Greene as Wayne county's candidate for the congressional nomination in the Fourteenth District.

By this action of the committee the claim of Wayne county to the nomination is put officially and strongly before the people of the district. Under the party rules the chairman of the state committee will fix a time and place for the district conference at which the candidate will be selected. At this conference Bradford will be entitled to four conferees, Susquehanna to three, Wayne two and Wyoming one.

The Bradford county committee held its meeting and elected its conferees on August 24 and it is reported that the conferees are pledged to the support of W. D. B. Ainey, Esq., of Susquehanna county, as a candidate for Congress. The Wyoming county committee held its meeting on August 19th and elected its conferee, and named Hon. William N. Reynolds of Wyoming county as its candidate. While Susquehanna county has not yet taken action, it is presumed that Capt. Ainey, who appears to have already obtained the promised support of Bradford county, will receive the are endorsement of his party at home. On the face of it, therefore, the alliance between Bradford and Susquehanna will give Capt. Ainey seven out of ten votes in the conference and secure for him the district nomination. 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
