TREATY TO PREVENT DRYING OF NIAGARA.

United States and Canada Reach An Agreement. The United States and Canada have

made in response to a general demand that the question of water diversion be settled once and for all in accordance with expert opinion. The treaty maker had tests conducted by hydraulic en-gineers, and it was determined that diversions should not exceed 36,000 cubic feet a second on the Canadian side and 20,000 cubic feet a second on the American side, out of a total flow of 240,000 cubic feet a second.
