

vital statistics reveals many interest-ing facts. Honesdale, the County ing facts. Honesdale, the County Seat of Wayne county, with a popu-lation of almost 3,000, can boast of only thirty births last year, as over against a death record of forty-one or a mortality rate of 1.03 per cent.

Statistics go to show that Texas township, with a population almost twice that of Honesdale borough, had only five more deaths among her population than did the County Seat. Still more remarkable is the fact, that while only thirty births occursay the light of day in Texas township, or almost four times as many as in Honesdale. Watch Texas grow!
