Political Parties to Select Delegates to Conventions.

The Wayne county commissioners have issued a proclamation in which they announce that the spring pri-mary election will be held Saturday, April 13, next, when the several po-litical martine will litical parties will name candidates for Congress, the general assembly and delegates to the state and na-tional conventions. The proclams tional conventions. The proclama-tion declares that the election will just as ably defended by Norman Swingle, Ruth Gess and Laura Decker. The judges decided in favbe held in all the voting precincts in the county between the hours of 2 and 8 p. m. on that day. The sev-eral political parties-the Republi-Democratic, Prohibition Keystone-have filed with the comand missioners the necessary preliminary notices, entitling them to have ballots printed for use at the primaries. The delegate petitions are filed with the commissioners while those aspiring for congressional and assembly honors have to be filed in the office Bentley, a member of one of the pioneer families of this part of the state, who died recently at the home of the secretary of the Common-wealth, Harrisburg. The chairman of the county com-

mittees of the different political organizations have filed with the county commissioners the number committeemen to be elected in the various districts in the county at the primaries. This is in accord with another requirement of the uniform of primaries act.

The number of delegates to the conventions are computed from the general vote cast for the last Governor, and county chairmen notify commissioners of the number to which their respective parties are en-titled, and also as to the number of committeemen according to the party rules.
