**HON. H. C. JACKSON.**  
Several have asked me personally and others by letter how I stand on the following questions and have requested me to publish a statement of my views. I assume that the public at this time has a right to know. I favor the election of U. S. Senators by direct vote of the people.

There seems to be a question or a misunderstanding as to how I stand on the above question, some of my friends throughout the country being under the impression that I voted against the proposed resolution at the last session of the legisla- ture. The fact is that it did not come to a vote at all but was in a very unfair and underhanded way ruled out until too late to present to Congress before the adjournment of that body last winter. I did, how- ever, have the pleasure of signing a petition to congress with, I think, about eighty-five others who would have voted for it setting forth our position on the above question.

I am a farmer and as such am in- terested in all that the farmer and the farmers' organization, the Grange, are interested in and if elected will favor any and all legisla- tion in their behalf.  
Any legislation in favor of the wage-earner upon whom the farmer is to a great extent dependent, will also receive my support.  
I am in favor of free bridges on the Delaware and will use all honor- able means to obtain them.  
I am in favor of the people having a voice in the making of our laws and am, therefore, in favor of local option and all other measures which

give the voters a chance to say how and by what laws we shall be gov- erned; and shall favor such legisla- tion as will offer the freest and full- est expression of citizens on ques- tions concerning the government of the State.

**WATER CO. CANNOT FORCE PAYMENT OF BILL**

**United States Supreme Court Ren- ders Decision of Far Reaching Importance.**  
Washington, April 4.—Shutting off water of delinquent consumers to make them pay their bills is a prac- tice of water companies disapproved to-day by the Supreme court. That the companies cannot cause an en- forced drouth by such means to make customers pay up old debts was de- clared by the court.  
The decision was handed down in the suit of Albert L. Hatch, of Couv- er d'Alene City, Idaho, against the Municipal Water company. The Idaho Supreme court ordered the water company to connect Hatch's pipes and furnish him water, although his rental was in arrears.  
It was also stipulated that water companies must bear the expense of tapping their pipes to furnish con- nection with all city residences.

In reference to the above the Scranton Tribune-Republican editorially says:  
"The Supreme court in Washington the other day rendered a decision which comes very close to the poor. The water company of Couver d'Alen City, Idaho, shut off the water from the premises of Albert L. Hatch be- cause Hatch had failed to pay his water bill. The case finally got be- fore the highest court in the land and the court has ordered the water com- pany to put back its pipes and turn on the water and supply to Albert L. Hatch all he wants. In other words, it is the judgment of the Supreme Court that the water company can- not shut off the water from the man's house in order to compel him to pay his bill. Possibly the same ruling will apply to all public service cor- porations. It has come to be a very common device with water com- panies, gas companies, electric light companies and telephone companies to shut off their service when their cus- tomers fall in arrears. The court might not rule in the same manner in the case of gas, electric and tele- phone companies, but in the Hatch case it was decided that companies cannot cause an enforced drouth to make customers pay old debts.

"Public service corporations have generally adopted rather harsh meth- ods of collection. People ought to pay their bills, but it is a question whether the corporations have the right to press collections by any other means than those which are open to merchants or any other service professions. To turn off the water or light from a man's house would seem to be a very drastic collection method and if permitted at all ought to be a last resort after all other means have failed."
