





TESTING SEED CORN.

Prolonged rains in August and September followed by a severe early freeze damaged much seed early freeze damaged hospital on Saturday last where his corn in Pennsylvania. All seed corn right leg, which was fractured, was should be given a germination test as promptly as possible. Seed that does not give a satisactory germination should not be used. To use the average seed corn of the state this year without rejecting the bad ears would result in a loss of about \$6, 000,000 to Pennsylvania farmers.

The Pennsylvania State College experiment station has just concluded a test of 102 samples of seed corn collected from 53 of the 67 countles of Pennsylvania, six kernels from each ear.

An average of all tests shows \$0.6 per cent, of the kernels germinated. By rejecting 263 had ears from every 1,000 the remaining ears give an average germination of 96.5 per This is satisfactory and can be cent. secured by making a germination test of each ear. For method of testing seed corn see circular No. 30 of the Department of Agricultural Extension
