All Overtures of Taft Men to Governor Hadley, Roosevelt Leader, For Compromise Having Been Refused Two Conventions Are In

Prospect.

Cedar Rapids, Ia., April 25.-The wildest Republican state convention tion of resolutions presented by the majority instructing Iowa's four delegates at large to the national conven-764 against 720 for Senator A. B. Cummins. The resolutions were brief.

The delegates at large are Governor Carroll of Des Moines, George D. Perkins of Sloux City, Luther A. Brewer of Cedar Rapids and J. F. Bryan of Creston.

Before the convention met Senator Cummins admitted that it looked like defeat. Asked if he would withdraw from the presidential race, he replied: "I have been knocked down and dragged out, but I never withdraw." The result in the state contest is that of Iowa's delegation of 26 votes Taft has 16 and Cummins 10.

Two Missouri Conventions.

St. Louis, Mo., April 25.-Two Republican state conventions will probably be held here this afternoon, all overtures of the Taft forces to Governor Hadley, the Roosevelt leader, for compromise baving been declined. As the hour for the state conven-

ion approached, the state committee was still debating on the contests instituted in fifteen countles and the Sixth ward of St. Louis, which incolves the seating of 203 delegates. The decision on these contests means he control of the convention. Taft enders claim that on the final quesion the Taft forces will control by a vote of 17 to 15.

For, after all its years and miles rolling, river coal comes eventualto rest on a sand shoal. The ony parts of the river bottom give lodgment against the swift curnt, no place to imbed itself. a sand bar it can bury itself like clam. Particle after particle comes rest here, each adding to the size the barrier, like coral
