## DRAWING NET AROUND GIBSON

Death Caused by Strangulation, Says Doctor—Witness Saw Struggle.

Goshen, N. Y., Nov. 21.—Tempered with the mildness and merriment of a homelike atmosphere, justice in Orange county is proving itself relentless in linking the chain of evidence against Burton W. Gibson, the lawyer accused of murdering his client for her estate. The state's principal witnesses so far have made out the strongest possible case of circumstantial evidence against the accused.

"Pressure on the pneumogastric nerve, controlling the heart and lungs, will cause death instantaneously," declared Dr. George W. King of Jersey City. "The lungs were flat. Nothing found at the autopsy indicated that the deceased died of drowning. Everything indicates that she died of strangulation by force applied from without."

This testimony followed a demonstration by John Minturn, storekeeper, of Sterling Forest, who told how he saw Gibson struggling with the Szabo woman in the boat on the day the woman was drowned. This witness described in some detail what he saw on the day.

Minturn's narrative evidently upset the defendant and his wife. Both were very pale, and Gibson twisted his fingers and rubbed his hands nervously. When he put his hand to his face the wife took hold of his fingers and pulled it down, looking into his eyes. Then she turned to Attorney Elder and watched his grueling cross examination.

Dr. King's testimony was next in importance to Minturn's.

The motive for the murder was established by Mr. Wassergovell by showing Gibson was the executor of the Szabo estate. Six bank clerks from different institutions showed that the lawyer within a month after his client's death tried to close all her savings accounts.

## AT WORK ON BUDGET BILL.

House Committee Is Framing New Appropriation Measures.

Washington, Nov. 21.—Preparations to take another \$1,000,000,000 from Uncle Sam's till at the coming session of congress were made when the subcommittee of the house appropriations committee met to frame appropriation bills.

The legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill, to furnish funds for all federal departments, the White House and the federal courts, was taken up.

Representative Johnson of South Carolina, chairman of the subcommittee, stated that he planned to have the "budget bill" ready for congress when it meets on Dec. 2.

## BRYAN MAKES A DENIAL.

Says He Is Not Going to Bermuda to Talk About Cabinet Places.

Washington, Nov. 21.—William Jennings Bryan wired the following message in answer to a query as to the truth of the widely circulated report that he had been asked by President Elect Wilson to accept the post of secretary of state and would go to Bermuda to confer with the governor:

I have had no conference with Governor Wilson, have never discussed any office with him and have no intention of going to Bermuda. W. J. BRYAN.

Bryan's message was sent from Savannah, where he lectured.
