The popular vote for President in the elections of 1912 shows that Wilson polled throughout the country a total of 6,156,748 votes, Roosevelt 3,928,140 and Taft 3,376,122. The Socialist vote for Debs amounted to 673,783, with the Socialist count still unfinished in seven states.

The case of Rev. J. D. Fry, former pastor of the Christian church of Madisonville, who is suing the elders and trustees for more than \$250 salary, has been postponed until next Monday afternoon. L. P. Wedeman, counsel for the pastor, declares that Rev. Mr. Fry was to receive \$500 per year for his services as well as free rent for his family. The attorney further states that his client was engaged for the full term, but before it expired the church officials informed him that they desired to make a change and requested his resignation. The suit followed. Among the defendants in the summons are Isaac Biesecker, J. W. Hornbaker, Enos Schwartz, and Charles Herbauck, elders, and E. E. Hornbaker, Z. T. Schwartz and B. W. Biesecker, trustees, and W. M. Waderman, Olive Waderman, Laura E. Walters and C. L. Schoonover.

Myers appeared as a witness against Barton and this fact saved him from a longer term of imprisonment. Barton was sent to the penitentiary for from three to ten years at the last term of quarter sessions. Austin Johnson, colored, was sent to jail for six months for burglary at Mark G. Melvin's apartments, 321 Spruce street. He stole clothing, most of which was recovered by the police. Judge Searle imposed the sentence.
