CHARLES P. SEARLE, son of President Judge A. T. Searle, was born in Honesdale on 15, 1884, and is a member of the law firm of Searle & Salmon of Honesdale. He received his preliminary education in the Honesdale which he attended for a number of years. After leaving the school here he entered the Montclair Military Academy at Montclair, N. J. He graduated from this school in the class of 1903 and in the same year he began a course of study at Amherst college, Massachusetts, which institution he graduated from in 1907, with the degree of A. B. One year previous to his graduation he passed the preliminary examination before the State Board of Law Examiners and after graduating from Amherst he entered the law office of his father where he registered as a student of law. He continued the pursuit of his law studies under the direction of his father, Charles P. Searle, who is President Judge of the county, for some years before he went to Scranton to com-

cashier of the bank in which he worked. He successfully passed the examination before the State Board of Law Examiners in December, 1910, and on recommendation of the board he was admitted to the bar of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania on January 27, 1911. Upon the formation of the Hawley Bank in 1910 he was appointed its cashier which position he now holds. Mr. Houck does not practice.

In July of the same year he passed the preliminary examination of the State Board of Law Examiners and registered as a student of law in the offices of Judge Henry Wilson in Honesdale. In 1906 he entered the Dickinson School of Law at Carlisle, from which he graduated in June, 1909, with the degree of Bachelor of Laws. He was admitted to the court of Common Pleas of Wayne county on February 10, 1910. On February 28th of the same year he was admitted to the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania. He was recently admitted to the U. S. Circuit and District courts and the Superior Court of this state. He is now associated in practice with his former preceptor, Hon. Henry Wilson, with offices in the Dimmick building on Ninth street.

ALONZO T. SEARLE, President of the twenty-second judicial district, comprising Wayne county, was appointed by Governor Stuart on September 15, 1909, to fill the vacancy caused by

the death of Judge George S. Purdy. He served the unexpired term as Judge and in November, 1911, was elected to continue in that capacity. Judge Searle was born in New Marlboro, Mass., September 13, 1856. After graduating with honors from St. Johnsbury Academy in 1873 and Amherst College in 1877, he went to Philadelphia, where he taught in the Cheltenham Academy, after going to Williamsport, where he studied law with Hon. B. S. Bentley, brother of G. F. Bentley, of the firm of Waller

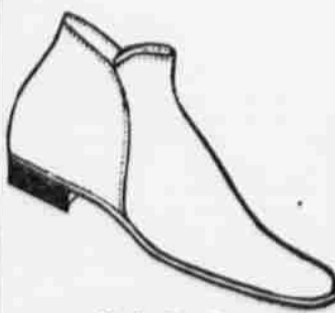

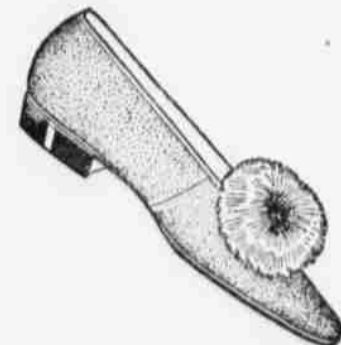

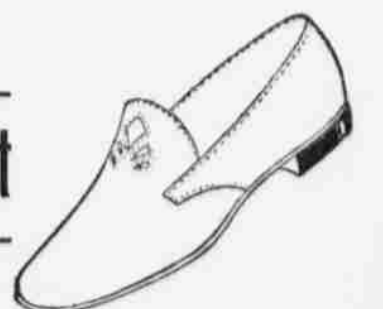
