Saturday of this week is another trade day.

A new barber and dentist have arrived in Honesdale. Surely the town is growing.

Miss Irma Hill, who was famed as the only commissioned woman deputy sheriff in Illinois, has been captured by cupid and is now Mrs. A. R. Vogel, of Kansas City.

The annual memorial sermon for the fire companies of Honesdale and Texas will be delivered by Dr. J. W. Balta in St. Mary Magdalen's church on Sunday evening, Jan. 12.

"The Merry Widow," a musical comedy, will appear at the Lyric on the 30th. "The Music Makers," the second number in the series of the High school concert course, comes to Honesdale the 31st of this month.

Attorney P. H. Hoff effected a satisfactory settlement with the Delaware and Hudson Railroad company for his client, William O'Hara, of Prompton, who was injured while alighting from the passenger train at Prompton on August 28th last.

The Wayne County Medical society will hold their quarterly meeting at the Allen House on Thursday afternoon, December 19. Dinner will be served at half past one and the business meeting of the society will follow. Dr. R. W. Brady is president of the society.

In the Elm Park parsonage Monday afternoon, Rev. George Wood Anderson, D. D., of Scranton, united in marriage Victor White of Carbondale and Miss Mary Bigelow of Waymart.

President Taft Monday named Dr. Carl Alsberg to succeed Dr. Harvey W. Wiley as chief of the Chemistry Bureau of the Department of Agriculture and chief administrator of the Pure Food law.

Dr. Chris Barager, formerly of Hazelton, has opened offices in the Foster building over the old postoffice. He comes well recommended from Hazelton and will undoubtedly enjoy a large patronage here.

The Carbondale knitting mills has an order from Sam Budd, the great Madison Square haberdasher, of New York, to make up one of their best knit overcoats for Christy Mathewson, pioneer pitcher of the New York Giants.

John Dorcan, of Roscoe, was instantly killed and Michael Koderonia of Brownsville, was probably fatally hurt and Mary Koderonia was badly cut when they were struck by a Pittsburg, Virginia and Charleston railroad train on a grade crossing near Roscoe on Monday.

Joseph Billings, of Carbondale, met with a peculiar accident while hunting in Wayne county last week. He was standing on an old log, which broke under him to the ground and fractured three of his ribs. Before the accident occurred the hunter bagged twenty rabbits.

Two hundred dollars were paid in fines by two Monroe hunters for violating the game law. Frank Houston, of Shawnee, and Luther Michaels, of Middle Smithfield township, were the offenders. Both shot a doe in mistake for a buck. Houston claimed the doe and buck were close together and that he tried to shoot the latter and killed the former.

John E. Baldwin, father of John R. Baldwin, proprietor of the Manor House, at Livingston Manor, died Sunday evening from the infirmities of old age, in his 68th year. The deceased was one of the old pioneers of Sullivan county and years ago lumbered and rafted it along the Delaware. He began steering a sloop when a boy of 18 and was considered one of the most expert helmsmen along the river.

Tuesday morning the new State Hospital for the criminal insane at Farview received its first patient, B. Frank Smith, who two years ago killed his father and brother-in-law at Uniontown, Fayette county. To the causal observer Smith shows little signs of insanity. He was a school teacher before he went suddenly insane. He talks fluently and intelligently on many subjects. A remarkable thing about his appearance is that his hair is gray on one side of his head and black on the other. More patients will arrive this week. About sixty commitments are expected.

According to information gained recently by a Citizen reporter, there is at least one of our local industries which is about to close a very prosperous year. This is the Honesdale Union Stamp Shoe Co., manufacturers of Men's, Youths' and Boy's Shoes of all kinds. We understand that the volume of business done in 1912 was over one-third greater than that of 1911, and the fact that one of their salesmen, Chas. Bushwaller, last week made a new record for weekly sales of several hundred dollars greater than the previous one, shows that their business is still on the gain, and December is one of the hardest months in the year for the manufacturer to sell shoes.

William Williamson, of Dickson City, formerly an engineer at Hotel Casey, Scranton, has been appointed assistant engineer at the State Asylum for Criminal Insane at Farview. Mr. Williamson received notice of his appointment and to report at the asylum at once from Dr. T. C. Fitzsimmons, the superintendent. There were more than 100 applicants for the position, but the selection of Mr. Williamson will admit of no argument that he received the position through "pull." He is one of the most competent and thorough stationary engineers in the valley, a high class mechanic, and has had a wide experience in electrical engines and a sound knowledge of all the operations of stationary equipment generally.
