Mr. Rustomjee cited the case of a 'so called Swami" who at one time was on very friendly terms with a wealthy Chicago family. By the daughters of the house he was looked upon as one of their brother's friends. When he returned to India the teacher received occasional letters from the girls of the house, written innocently and full of affectionate regard for him as a religious teacher. He published these letters in certain Indian papers. "A true Indian religious teacher," Mr. Rustomjee went on to say, "would never associate with women. He

would not eat meat or drink wine. In one word, he has to live the strictly aesthetic life. In America we find the 'so called Swamis' living luxurious lives with rich Americans, eating and procured by a comprehensive study of drinking, dressing gorgeously, traveling in Pullmans. Only the other day Mrs. Sanborne of Somerville, Mass., writing of an entertainment she had

given a 'Swami,' said that he had drunk an entire bottle of brandy at one sitting and eaten two pounds of

meat. He weighed 200 pounds and called himself an aesthete. He promised her diamonds, rubles and costly

apparel, asked her how old she was and when she told him she was thirtyfive called her 'mamma.'

Not True Philosophy.

"These 'Swamis' who come to America do not teach the real philosophy of India, the Vedanta, but they teach a mixture of German philosophy with a little eastern mysticism thrown in. They teach the worship of Christ side by side with the worship of Krishna and Kall, the latter a goddess who delights in the drinking of human blood. according to the Hindu scriptures. She has for her carrings two heads of men she has slaughtered, a necklace of skulls and a waistband of human hands. This is the goddess American


