Over \$50,000,000 in duty was paid on these commodities during the last year on record. A campaign for the repeal of these food taxes is likely to assume important dimensions in the near fu-



Prisoner Has Ability to Increase or Decrease His Measurements.

William J. Reed, in prison at Folsom, Cal., and described by the police of Washington as a dangerous swindler, has been identified, it is asserted, through photographs, as a man who has been sought by detectives for a year, during which time, it is alleged, he has swindled a number of business men in various parts of the country out of many thousands of dollars.

A photograph of the prisoner in California has been identified by a local complainant, although the measurements of the prisoner show him to be six feet one inch tall, while the man wanted here is described as about five feet nine inches. The detectives say the prisoner is able to stretch his height and that this accounts for the liscrepancy in his measurements. He is said to have the knack of dereasing or increasing his stature at will, with a range of four inches.

Attached to the cylinder was a highly sensitive recorder, and it is from records made that the scientific spiritualists state they have found that--The records were made by a limited being. The being had intelligence since it took part in the experiments. The being was gaseous, as it obeyed the laws which govern gases. The density of the body was equal to that of air. DEADLIEST GUN INVENTED. Frenchman Designs Weapon Which Throws Light on Object. A French inventor has made a frightful addition to the efficacy of the revolver. A small but powerful electric light is attached to the mechanism of a pistol of ordinary size. By use of lenses and mirrors the glare of the circle of light which the lamp throws is

a light colored suit of clothes. Now, the center of the circle of light, marked by a black spot, by arrangement of the lenses is exacily the spot where the bullet will strike. Thus all one has to do is to place the black center of the blazing circle of light over the heart of an adversary and pull the

At night the light is shockingly strong. Experiments with the new weapon show that perfect greenhorns. who have never used a revolver in their lives, can shoot far more accurately than experts using an ordinary pistol. Up to sixty yards one cannot miss a small bullseye, day or night. while extremely accurate shooting is possible up to 100 yards. The lamp arrangement adjusts automatically by levels to distances.
