Men had been at work dragging the lake since Thursday but no trace of the body could be found. The finding of the remains Tuesday morning was by accident. A party of men from Scranton were fishing in the lake with a drag line and pulled the body to the surface. The men thought at first that they had pulled up a stump of a tree. The gruesome find proved on examination to be the body of the unfortunate man who was drowned last Thursday. They notified the authorities and Coroner P. B. Petersen, of Honesdale, was called. He went there and empaneled a jury who found a verdict of accidental death by drowning. The remains in Scranton were notified and the remains were taken to Scranton that afternoon for burial.
