MARYLAND-DELAWARE HORTICULTURAL SOCIETIES.

The joint summer meeting of the Maryland-Delaware Horticultural Societies will be held at Berlin, Maryland, July 31st, 1913. The societies will be entertained by J. G. Harrison & Sons, the noted nursery firm of this place. The meeting promises to be of unusual importance and interest, inasmuch as this firm has enormous plantings of nursery stock, covering over 2,500 acres, and also over 2,000 acres in orchards planted in and around Berlin.

It will be the aim of the firm to transport visitors over their plantations, explaining to them the manner in which they raise trees and handle nursery stock. Visitors will also be conducted to orchards which this season will be bearing luscious peaches that will be ripe at that time. This will offer an unusual opportunity for growers to observe how perfect fruit can be grown on the Peninsula by the employment of up-to-date methods of spraying and culture. the School of Horticulture of the Maryland Agricultural College, is conducting a series of experiments and demonstrations in the
