A POISONING CONSPIRACY

THE PLOT REVEALED. Non-Union Workmen at the Homestead Pa. Mills, the Victims.

Deputy Sheriff Patrick J. Farrell of Pittsburgh, accompanied by A. A. Ester, arrived in Frankfort, Ky., Wednesday afternoon to procure from the governor a warrant of arrest for Robert Beatty, who is now confined in the Louisville jail, charged with being a fugitive from justice. Mr. Farrell came here direct from Pittsburgh, while Mr. Ester has been in Louisville for several days in charge of the case. Deputy Farrell laid before Gov. Brown the requisition from Gov. Patton, and other documents, including the affidavit against Beatty and the testimony upon which the affidavit was issued.

Beatty is charged in the affidavit with administering poison to William E. Griffin, a non-union workman at the Carnegie mill at Homestead. The original warrant for the arrest of Beatty was issued upon information furnished by J. H. Ford, but before the warrant could be served Beatty left Allegheny county, and his whereabouts were not known until he was arrested in Louisville a few days ago. Since his arrest, and while the authorities were waiting for the necessary papers to arrive from Pennsylvania, he has sought by means of habeas corpus proceedings to be released.

This writ of habeas corpus was refused by Judge Foster of the Louisville law and equity court, and now that the officer from Pittsburgh has arrived and procured the warrant from Gov. Brown the prisoner will be taken back to Pittsburgh for trial. The crime for which Beatty is to be tried is the poisoning of several non-union workmen at the Homestead mills last September, and the original warrant against Beatty was issued by James McInister, a justice of the peace of Allegheny county, upon the testimony of Patrick Gallagher, who is himself implicated in the crime, and of J. H. Ford, who overheard some of the conversation of the conspirators.

Gallagher's confession goes on to state that he was employed as a cook at one of the restaurants upon the Carnegie mill property and that on some day between the 21st and 24th of August he was spoken to by Beatty in Pittsburgh about putting something in the tea or coffee of the workmen, the object being to make them sick. On the following day Beatty and himself in company with J. M. Davidson and H. F. Dempsey, had a conversation in regard to procuring the stuff to be put in the tea or coffee. Croton oil was suggested, but the idea was not favorably considered by Gallagher. He then, however, objected on the ground that it was dangerous to use croton oil.

Gallagher says he was told to come back every day or two to see whether the stuff had been procured and that on the 7th or 8th of September he received from Dempsey a bottle containing three yellow powders. He was told that there were three doses and one powder was sufficient for thirty gallons of tea or coffee. Gallagher says he mixed one of the powders in the tea which was drunk by the workmen in restaurant No. 1, and that several were taken sick and prevented from working.

Gallagher says that sometime during the month of September Beatty gave him three powders which looked like those Dempsey had given him. He used them in the same manner and they made many workmen sick, Griffin being one of the number. Gallagher says that he received from Beatty in money \$2 at one time and at another \$1. First he used the powder in having heard some conversation between the conspirators in regard to the matter. This is the substance of the testimony taken when the warrants were sworn out.

TRAIN ROBBERS THWARTED. Masked Men Disarmed by Passengers and Trainmen After Fatally Shooting One Man, but They Escape. Four masked men attempted to rob the passengers on the Chesapeake and Ohio midnight train within the city limits of Huntington, W. Va., Tuesday night. The train was just pulling out of Huntington when two men entered the passenger coach from the smoker. Both wore slouch hats, pulled well down over their eyes. They stationed themselves each at a door of the car, masked themselves and, without warning, began firing with their revolvers right and left, to terrify the passengers.

A Cincinnati man named Tuck, who, with his wife, was on a bridal tour to Germany, jumped up and grappled with the robbers. He was knocked down, but the desperado knocked him down, and his companion running up shot Tuck through the head, inflicting a fatal wound. The train collected and several passengers then attacked the robbers, succeeded in wresting their revolvers from them. When they were deprived of their weapons the fellows leaped from the train and escaped. Immediately upon arrival in Guyandotte the train officials gave the alarm, and a posse was organized to hunt the men down.

In the scuffle on the train a passenger named Peter Drake, of Cincinnati, was shot through the foot.

FOUR KILLED BY A TORNADO. The Storm Levels Everything in its 300-Yard Wide Path. A tornado passed two miles above Summit, Miss. The house of Rev. S. R. Young, a Baptist minister, was completely demolished and the occupants were buried in the ruins. Relief parties were organized at once and a search was made for the victims. Mrs. Young and family were rescued from the ruins of their dwelling, all dangerously wounded. The four persons killed are a 6-year-old daughter of S. A. Lowe, William A. Freeman, colored; a colored woman, name unknown, and a colored baby, not identified. Many persons were badly wounded. The storm, which was 300 yards wide, carried everything with it. Large pine trees were uprooted and blown to pieces. The dwelling of S. A. Lowe was completely destroyed, his household effects being scattered for miles.

PRISONERS IN THEIR CELL. Two Lock-up Prisoners Scalded to Death While They Slept. Simon Mitchell, an old resident of Batavia, Ill., was locked up in the city jail for intoxication, together with William Fitch, from Ohio. The room in which the men were confined is heated by steam pipes. Through some unknown cause an explosion occurred, which filled the room with hot steam that literally burned the prisoners to death before they could be rescued.

MINNEAPOLIS MILLER OUTPUT. The "Northwestern Flour" (Minneapolis) says: The mills made another big run last week. The output being the heaviest in three weeks. Certain mills did the best they have on this crop, a very fair water power aiding them considerably. The aggregate production for this week was 191,593 barrels.

TRAMPS MURDER A JEW FAMILY. A Jewish keeper, his wife and four children, living in the outskirts of Vilna, Russia, have been murdered by tramps. The rascals demanded food, and on being refused stabbed the Jew and his wife to death and cut their children's throats. The murderers have been arrested.

STOPPING IMMIGRANT TICKETS. Secretary Peters, of the Continental Steamship Association, London, states that the members of the association have cabled to their American agents to cease the sale of prepaid tickets for immigrant passengers to the United States.

Daubigny, on the other hand, gave himself up more to the impression of the moment, endeavoring to express the local qualities of form and color in all their brilliancy and freshness. He did not reach perfection of style at the beginning of his career, but through most devoted study, guided by the native strength and originality of his views; nor did this high epoch of landscape-art come hastily or accidentally, but was made possible by the united efforts of many men and minds working together during the first half of our century—Century.
