Miller Murdered by Hawkins in Fifteen

Rounds. At San Francisco, William Miller, the feather-weight pugilist, who was defeated by Dal Hawkins in the Pacific athletic club, died of concussion of the brain, resulting from injuries received in the fight. Both men weighed 122 pounds when they entered the ring. Miller, who was 21 years old, came from Sacramento, and had no science, relying on brute strength, while Hawkins was very clever. They fought 15 rounds Miller being terribly punished, while Hawkins was uninjured. All concerned in the fight were placed under arrest on the charge of murder.

### How to Gurse a Woman's Age.
