The "seventeen-year locusts" are due in twenty-two states and territories during the months of May, June and July. If they do not appear in large numbers this year, it will be because the entomological authorities are all at sea in their predictions, or else the growth of civilized communities has had a tendency to decrease their broods.

A medical man who has given the matter considerable attention says: "Looking at the physical development, health, symmetry of form, beauty, increase, and perpetuity of the native American people, it is perfectly safe to say that tight dressing, as it is practiced today among the women and girls of our country, is the greatest evil that exists. Seventy years ago, tight dressing among women was principally confined to the waist and the chest, but today it is carried down as low as possible towards the hips. Of late years we have had advertised, by the manufacturers or their agents, corsets for 'contracting and elongating the waist,' and we see the sad results of their use in the deformed women all around us."

The Pennsylvania Tramp law provides that any tramp who enters a dwelling house against the permission of the owner or even kindles a fire on road or on land of another, without the owner's consent, may, on conviction, be sentenced to imprisonment. Any act of vagrancy, such as going about begging from place to place, is prima facie evidence that the offender is a tramp, and he cannot escape as such unless he can prove by satisfactory evidence that he does not make a practice of begging. A peculiarity of the Pennsylvania Tramp Act is the authority it gives to any person, an officer or otherwise, upon view of an offense described in the act, to arrest the offender and take him before a magistrate. Every citizen and any number of citizens in the country are officers for the enforcement of this law.

Boys are sometimes tempted to think that to be tender-hearted is to be weak and unmanly. Yet the tenderest heart may be associated with the strongest and most forcible mind and will. Take, for example, the story told of him to whom we owe our wonderful railway system. George Stephenson went one day into an upper room of his house, and closed the window. It had been open a long time because of the great heat, but now the weather was becoming cooler, and so Mr. Stephenson thought it would be well to shut it. He little knew at the time what he was doing. Two or three days afterward, however, he chanced to observe a bird flying against it with all its might again and again, as if trying to break it. His sympathy and curiosity were aroused. What could the little thing want? He went at once to the room and opened the window to see. The window opened, the bird flew straight to one particular spot in the room, where Stephenson saw a nest. The poor bird looked at it, took the sad story in at a glance, and fluttered down to the floor, broken-hearted, almost dead. Stephenson, drawing near to look, was filled with unspeakable sorrow. There sat the mother bird, and under it four tiny little ones—mother and young—all apparently dead. Stephenson cried aloud. He tenderly lifted the exhausted bird from the floor, the worm it had so long and so bravely struggled to bring to its home and young, still in its beak, and carefully tried to revive it, but all his efforts proved in vain. It speedily died, and the great man mourned for many a day. At that time the force of George Stephenson's mind was changing the face of the earth, and was deeply grieved because he himself had unconsciously been the cause of death.

The Colorado Excursion.
