Chesapeake bay has an area of 2,835 square miles, and is one of the greatest inland bodies of water on the American It contains numerous continent. islands, and is the receptacle of several navigable rivers which drain the interior of Maryland and adjacent states. Its picturesque shores are indented by many small bays, inlets and estuaries. Its waters, in conjunction with those of the Patuxent, the James, the Potomac, the Elizabeth, the Nansemond and other important streams, debouch on Hampton roads, forming one of the deepest, safest and most commodious harbors in the world. From early colonial times the articles of traffic and commerce carried on the Chesapeake between its various ports and landings by steam and sail craft reach a stupendous aggregate, and the growth of this business has kept even pace with that of the towns and cities along the Atlantic coast. The facilities of cheap and prompt transportation by this natural water rout between New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore and all points south, defy the competition of land carriage, and are better known and more universally appreciated now than ever before. The first steam vessel on the bay was the Eagle, a side wheeler, built in 1813, which made occasional trips from Baltimore to Norfolk during the three years following. In 1839 the Baltimore Steam Packet Co. was organized and has continued in existence ever since. It was then as it is to-day the principal line running steamers on the bay, the Alabama, Georgia and Jewess, as late as 1841, comprising the regular boats on the rout. Of the twenty-seven steamers subsequently purchased, two were abandoned in a storm in 1859, one was sunk by collision, one was burned by the Confederates, and sixteen others were sold or otherwise disposed of. The Georgia and Carolina (included in this fleet) were the first iron vesselssignaling a marked improvement (from wood to iron) in marine architecture. The Bay Line was also the first to appreciate and adopt the manifold advantages of electricity as a cleanly and brilliant illuminator. The interior arrangements of the Bay Line, to make the journey on their steamers an experience of luxurious enjoyment never to be forgotten, are all that lavish expenditure directed by intelligence and good taste can effect.
