Five Hundred Tickets Given Away.

Upon the occasion of the recent National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic, at Buffalo, The Daily News, of Pittsburg, by way of compliment to the organization, supplied 250 comrades with tickets from Pittsburg to Buffalo and return free of charge.

The encampment of 1898 will be held at Cincinnati, Ohio. The commander-in-chief of the G. A. R. is Gen. J. P. S. Gobin, a Pennsylvanian. It therefore behooves comrades of the Department of Pennsylvania to make an especially large showing.

To help the event along The Daily News has decided to offer 500 railroad tickets from Pittsburg to Cincinnati and return, to be apportioned among seven posts selected by the general public, as follows:

Everybody Called Him Uncle.

Last week's issue of THE STAR contained an article on the death and burial of William McConnell, one of the early settlers of the Beechwoods, and hence we will not publish all of an obituary notice received Saturday from Rev. A. Z. Myers, of Allens Mills, as it would be a repetition in part of what we said last week.

Wm. McConnell was born in Centre county, Pa., March 14th, 1820, and died Sept. 29th, 1897, aged 77 years, 6 months and 12 days. He was twice married; first to Eliza McIntosh. To this union were born three children, David A., living home, Nancy Cooper, living on an adjoining farm and Reuben, of Falls Creek.

He was one of a large family and is the ninth of a mature age that has been gathered to the Beechwoods cemetery to await the resurrection. Only one brother, David, living near Brookville, survives. Few large families are permitted at mature age to slumber in one resting place.

He was outspoken, frank of disposition, and had won many friends. Since knowing him and since in the community we have nearly all called him "Uncle Billy McConnell." We do not know who is or who is not a nephew or niece and suppose we never shall, as old and young delighted to call him uncle. This speaks volumes as a neighbor, friend and citizen. He never united with the church, living his own quiet way. He expressed a willingness to die and seemed to long for release from his sufferings which he bore with remarkable fortitude.

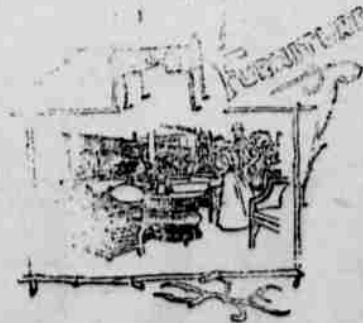
