Industries will not drop into our lap, we must roll them in by special work.

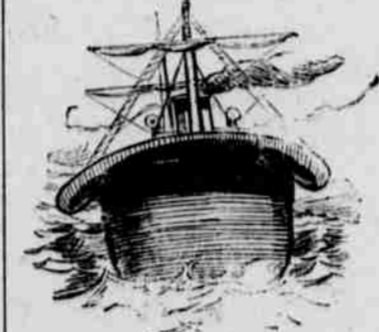
