## MINERAL WATERS.

Why and How They Heneft Those That Drink Them.
When a patient reachex a mineral Water health resort, he is examined by the rexident physician and ordered to drink certain quantities of the water at certain times during the day. These are ncreased from day to day until the maximum quantity necied is reached. fols upon rixing, two or three glaseen between treakfast aud dinner, the kame quantity in the afternoon aud a couple of glaseses before going to bei. The patient is urged to take it whether he wants it or not. He may suy that he is not thirsty, but that makes no difference; he must take it as a medicine. The quantity is increased until we have known 30 glasees per day to be taken. A part of the bencitit derived is because of the rest and change of scene. A part, perhaps, is from the small quantity of the sulta and other bases contained in these watera (we are not apeaking of cuthurtic or chalybeate waters), but the benefit from this source is very singht. The secret of the cure is in the quantity of water taken. If the wh rer be pure in woflent organtity, the re sults will be subatantially the same, re gardlesx of the "tracen" of lithia and smail quantities of sodium chloride and other salts. You can perform theme eures nt home with the ordinary drinking water, if of good quality, if you will require the patient to take it in the same quantity as at the springs. It is very easy to add lithia if dexired, but you must not lose sight of the fact that the quantity of water (not lithia) taken is the important thing.
