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School Appropriation

"There seems to be a misunderstanding in the minds of many persons as to the State appropriation made for the public schools for the current school year, which ends on the first Monday in Jone, 1899," said John L. Stewart, Deputy Superintendent of Public Instruction. In view of this fact, it would be proper for the school directors and others who are interested in the public schools to be rightly informed on the

"The appropriation for the school year ending in June, 1898, has been paid in full, and that for the year ending in June, 1899, will be paid after June of this year at such times as the State Treasurer will be able to meet the obligation. The \$5,000,000 which the distriets will receive for the year beginning June, 1899, will not be payable until after the first Monday in June, 1900. There can be no excuse, therefore, for any reduction in the wages of teachers for the next school year, beginning June, 1899.

"One other point which seems to be misunderstood is in connection with the fact that some districts have not levied any school taxes whatever during the current school year. There are also townships which have continued year after year to levy a very low tax rate. Many of these districts have provided only the minimum term of six months, but the Legislature at the last session enacted a law extending the minimum school term to seven months. This act goes into effect at the beginning of the school year, 1899, so that a majority of the townships will doubtless increase the tax rate in order to meet the demands of the act, which requires the schools to be kept open at least seven months annually.

"The statement has been widely published that many districts receive more from the State than is raised in the distriet by local taxation. This is true in many instances, but with the extension of the school term these districts will doubtless raise an increased local fund for the support of the school, if necessary to do so."

The Pittsburg Daily News clipped a local item from THE STAR last week and gave the DuBois Express credit. The only objection to be raised at this time will be by Mr. Spears for making it appear that he is a citizen of the hamlet called DuBois. However, the News has been guilty of clipping local items from THE STAR before this and giving other papers credit. Considering the number of exchanges that are hurriedly glanced over in the daily offices it is not surprising that wrong credits are given occasionally.
