It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to move, damage, deface or in any way to meddle with, injure or destroy any of the said barrels, boxes or other receptacles placed on the public streets of said borough by the Ladies' Improvement Society of Reynoldsville for the purpose of receiving and depositing therein any waste paper, rags, peclings, skins, hulls or shells of any kind.

Sec. 2. It is made the duty of the

It is made the duty of the policemen and constables in the said borough without warrant and upon view to arrest and commit for hearing, any and all persons guilty of violating this or-dinance or offending against it as aforesaid and upon summary conviction as in criminal cases as provided by law before the Chief Burgess or Justice of the Peace, and before whom complaint is made or the proceeding begun, shall pay a fine or penalty of not less than one or more than \$10.00 for each offense as aforesaid and upon judgment, pay-ment thereof to be enforced as may be provided by law and in case of default of payment of fine or penalty so imposed by said judgment, the defendant may be sentenced and committed in manner and form and for the time as directed by law, unless the plaintiff in the action elects otherwise to collect the said judgment for fine or penalty and costs as may be provided by law.

Sec. 4. That any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting with the pro-visions of this ordinance be and the same is hereby repealed so far as the

AN ORDINANCE to protect public water fountain and water at the corner of Main and Fifth streets in the borough

of Main and Fifth streets in the borough of Reynoldsville. Whereas, The citizens of the said borough have by public subscription erected a public water fountain for the benefit of the public generally, for the use of both man and beast. Said fountain was erected by and with the consent of the town council of said borough. And Whereas, Complaints have been made to said council by some of the citizens of said borough, that the side of the fountain made for men and

citizens of said borough, that the side of the fountain made for men and women to obtain water at, has been used for watering beasts, thereby polluting the water and endangering the health and life of the citizens, that sticks, stone, gravel and other substances have been wantonly and recklessly thrown into the fountain by persons to its injury and damage and the pollution of the water. That vehicles have been driven against said fountain wantonly, carelessly and recklessly.

Therefore be it enacted by the town council of the borough of Reynoldsville in council assembled, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same:

Sec. 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to water or attempt to water any kind of an animal or beast at that side of the aforesaid fountain used as adrinking place for the people, being the smallest bowl there-on, or to place or to put in said fountain any sticks, stones, gravel or other sub-stances to the damage or injury of said fountain or to the pollution of the water therein or coming therein or to wantontherein or coming therein or to wantonly, carelessly or recklessly ride or drive
any horse, horses, carriage, wagon or
other vehicle against the same or wantonly, carelessly or negligently do any
other act or thing to the injury, damage or defacement of said fountain or
the pollution of the water therein or
coming therein.

It is made the duty of the policemen and constables in the sa d borough without warrant and upon view to arrest and commit for hearing any and all persons guilty of violating this ordinance or offending against it as aforesaid and upon summary conviction as in criminal cases as provided by law before the Chief Burgess or Justice of the Peace before whom complaint is made or the proceeding begun, shall pay a fine or penalty of not less than one (\$1.00) nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) for each offense as aforesaid and upon judgment, payment theresaid and upon judgment, payment there-of to be enforced as may be provided by law and in case of default of payment of fine or penalty so imposed by said judgement, the defendant may be senjudgement, the defendant may be sentenced and committed in manner and form and for the time as directed by law, unless the plaintiff in the action elects otherwise to collect the said judgement for fine or penalty and costs as may be provided by law.




