#### Council Meeting.

The regular meeting of the town council was held on Wednesday evening, July 5th, Pres. Elliott in the chair. All members present but J. C. Ferris.

Minutes of previous meetings read and approved.

G. M. McDonald, Esq., was present in the interest of T. Tapper in regards to the raising of his barn to the grade of the sidewalk. Mr. McDonald also asked for a permanent corner on south side of Main street and Swamp aller. Also for an established grade for street and sidewalk on Hill street between 6th street and Russ street.

Capt. T. C. Reynolds was present in behalf of Mrs. Maggie Gorsline asking for permission to put in a pair of street scales at her place of business on Jackson street. On motion was referred to street committee with power to act.

The resignation of Nightwatchman John Cottle was read and on motion was accepted.

Burgess Stoke reported receipts to be \$20.50.

On motion the president appointed R. Smith, O. F. Smith, and A. J. Pierce as committee to confer with the property owners on south side of Main street between 4th street and Pine alley with a view to settlement of differences regarding sidewalk.

After an explanation by the president and a general discussion by the members of the conneil, the following resolution was passed: WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 55 to open 4th street was vetoed by the burgess, and whereas, in consequence of such changed conditions the burgess now withdraws his objections to said ordinance, and whereas there is a legal doubt as to the validity of present approval by the burgess, Otherefore be it Resolved. That the vote to pass the ordinance over the veto of the burgess be reconsidered.

On motion ordinance No. 55 was passed. Yeas, Deible, Cochran, Pierce, R. Smith, O. F. Smith and S. B. Elliott.

On motion the solicitor was instructed to take no further action in regard to the vacating of 5th street.

On motion the burgess was authorized to receive proposals for the opening of 4th and 5th streets until 7 o'clock p. m. on Saturday, July 15th, 1899, to construct extension of 4th street, from present end of said street to meet the work being done by the R. & F. C. R'y Co., and also to construct extension of 5th street as ordered by the court from present end to borough line. The fill in both of said streets to be equivalent to two feet in center and rounding properly for road bed, to nothing at a distance of twelve feet each side from said center line for the entire length of said streets.

As the present surface is uneven, an engineer will establish and set grade stakes for the work and compute quantities based on the dimensions above named. Bids may be made for lump sum for entire work or by cubic yard. Contractor to have advantage of proposition of R. & F. C. R'y Co. to deliver material for said 4th street at cost.

The right to reject any or all bids reserved.

The following applicants for nightwatchman, H. H. Mincer and James McPherson, were voted for and H. H. Mincer was elected.

On motion bills amounting to \$339.40 were ordered paid.

On motion adjourned to meet July 15th at 8 o'clock p. m.

It will be well for our citizens to remember that with this issue of THE STAR ordinances No. 58 and 57 become a law. If you have not already read the ordinances you had better read them now and govern yourselves accordingly. Ordinance No. 56 prohibits the scattering and throwing of waste paper, rags, peelings, skins, hulls or shells of any kind on the pavement, streets or alleys of the borough of Reynoldsville, and it also provides for the protection of barrels, boxes or other receptacles placed on the streets by the Ladies' improvement Society to receive said waste papers, &c. The young peosaid waste papers, &c. The young peo-ple, and many older ones, have become so accustomed to throwing things on to the streets that if the ordinance is enforced there will be a number of arrests made before the summer is over. We understand that the Ladies' Village Improvement Society will pay especial attention to the enforcement of this
