AN ORDINANCE authorizing the opening of the extension of Fourth street from Jackson street to the borough line at or near Sandy Lick creek, and the assessment of damages caused thereby and by the grade thereof. Whereas, the town council of the borough of Reynoldsville deem it necessary to open the extension of Fourth street in said borough, from Jackson street to the south borough line at or near Sandy Lick creek, therefore:

Sec. 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the town council of the borough of Reynoldsville in council assembled, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of the same, that the street committee be and is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be surveyed and opened the extension of Fourth street, from Jackson street to the south borough line at or near Sandy Lick creek, at a width of forty (40) feet in accordance with the accompanying plan, the damages caused thereby and the damages caused by the grade thereof and the benefits to pay the same to be assessed and collected in accordance with the provisions of the Acts of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, relating thereto and regulating the same.

Sec. 2. That so much of any ordinance as may conflict with or be supplied by the foregoing, be and the same is hereby repealed. Ordained and enacted into a law in council this 5th day of July, A.
