Tuesday this matter was being considered by Superintendent McConnell of Pittsburg, of the railway mail service, and he stated that he was preparing a report on the matter to the Washington officials.

From Butler to Reynoldsville the new railroad passes through territory that has heretofore never had any other than the star route service, where carriers on horse back and the old stage coach method were utilized. The postoffices reached were North Point, Dayton. Echo, Mosgrove, Cowansville, Craigsville and Fennellton, and they received their mail through the Kittanning postoffice, where it was distributed.

Under the plan proposed by utilizing the new Buffalo, Rochester & Pittsburg line these postoffices will have direct mail connection by rail with Pittsburg and under time schedule that is well adapted to the temporary needs of the service. There is a train leaving Reynoldsville at 7.15 o'clock in the morning and reaching Allegheny at 10.00 o'clock. which will permit the delivery of mail from the points named by noon in Allegheny. A train out of Allegheny will deliver mail on the new route in the evening and will give business me prompt service to the heretofore isolated but important territory.--Kittanning Republican.
