Last Thursday there was a young man in town, whose body was somewhat twisted and he was very lame, that was seeking aid by the sale of a "good luck" card with three or four verses of poetry on it. The young man had a woe-begone expression, which would naturally touch a sympathetic cord in human nature, that was the means of many a nickel being dropped into his dirty hand. The lameness was spasmodic and only affected him when he was begging. At other times he could walk without limping much. This young man gathered in the nickels in the manner above stated and then joined two other dirty looking tramps behind a box car near the A. V. Ry crossing in West Reynoldsville where they carried beer by the bucket full until they were very muchly intoxicated. Two of the tramps had begged bread and butter for the trio, while the other fellow played the cripple act and secured enough money for all to get drank. Thus the charitably inclined are ever and anon imposed upon by vagabonds.

The annual report of the state bureau of mines shows that 52,802,596 net tons of anthracite coal were produced in the state last year, and 64,247,635 tons of bituminous, an aggregate of 117,050,231 net tons, an increase of 9,794,623 tons over last year. There were also produced last year 10,171,920 tons of coke, an increase of 1.638,729. The number of persons employed in the bituminous mines last year was 87,802, an increase of 1,319. During the year 2,232 accidents occured, of which 609 were fatal. Forty-one per cent, of the fatal accidents resulted from carelessness or violation of the mine laws by the victims, and 43 per cent. of the non-fatal accidents from the same cause. Reports furnished by the ten inspectors of bituminous mines last year show that the coal in 323 mines is, owned by the operator end that in forty-one mines it is partly leased and partly owned. Ventilation is produced in 288 mines by furnaces, in 288 by fans, in three by steam and in thirty-four by natural

The outlook now is that before many years England will have to come to the United States and Pennsylvania for her supply of coal, unless, indeed, she can discover some substitute for use as fuel to keep her many industries going. This opinion was freely expressed at the English Institute of Mining Engineers, at which the subject of exhaustion of the coal fields was discussed. At present the annual output of England is 200,000,000 tons, but the from \$1.50 to \$5.00. decrease in production is such every year that half a century is given as the limit when the supply will cease. Then comes an end to her manufacturing supremacy. This country would be correspondingly benefited. The givingout of her coal mines would at once solve the "smoke problem" for England but to her great pecuniary damage. It is possible, of course, that a way may be discovered to make electricity, developed by chemical action, do the work of steam, but under conditions now existing coal is necessary for all important industrial operations. In this country, it is reassuring to learn, the supply of coal displays no signs of becoming exhausted. Even the veins now being worked, not allowing for the discovery of new ones, are good for 300 years more, at least. If England wants to buy coal she knows where to come for it. And Pennsylvania will reap no

inconsiderable share of the profits .-

Big Railroad Bridge.

Much difficulty has been experienced in securing a solid bottom for the stone piers to form the foundation of the big bridge to be erected across the mouth of the Kiskiminetas river, at Allegheny Junction by the Allegheny Valley rallroad. A drill test of over 100 feet failed to develop solid rock. As a result huge piles are being driven through the sand in the bottom of the river. The piles are being rendered still more stable by being surrounded by a mass of cement. The work is being carried on at night by means of electric light. When completed the bridge will be a very substantial one, of the best modern construction.-Kittunning Republican.
