BE IT ORDAINED and enacted by the town council of the borough of Reynoldsville, in council assembled, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same:

Section I. That the right of way is hereby granted to E. A. Ferrin, his heirs, successors or assigns to enter upon the public streets, lanes, alleys and public squares of the Borough of Reynoldsville, to creet, maintain and control poles and wires for the purpose of carrying and conducting electricity, for the period of fifty years, through said streets, lanes, alleys and public squares of the said borough of Reynoldsville as they now exist, or may be oldsville as they now exist, or may be bereafter changed, extended or estabnereatter changed, extended or established, for the purpose of supplying electricity to the citizens and inhabitants of the borough of Reynoldsville, and for the lighting of the stores, offices, dwelling houses, streets, lanes, alleys, public squares and other places where electric lights may be needed and desired, and for the supplying of electricity for motor power, or for heat to such person or persons as may desire the same

Section 2. Said poles shall be erected on the streets, lanes, alleys and public squares at such places and on such lines squares at such places and on such lines as the Street Committee of the said borough shall direct, and the poles shall be straight and of sufficient strength to carry all wires placed thereon, and shall not be less than twenty-five feet in height above the streets.

Section 3. The said E. A. Ferrin, his successors or assigns, shall within ninety days after this Ordinance goes into effect, commence to erect such lines and prosecute said work with reasonable diligence until said plant is completed. Section 4. This Ordinance shall not go into effect until the said E. A. Ferrin, his successors or assigns shall file the stipulation accepting the same with all its provisions, and agreeing to be

all its provisions, and agreeing to be bound thereby. Said acceptance to be filed within ten days or this ordinance to be null and void.

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the AN ORDINANCE authorizing the laying out, construction and building of a public sewer in Hill street from an alley at or near the estate of James Flynn, deceased, where said street intersects with said alley to a point where said sewer will connect with a proposed main sewer at or near where Hill street intersects with Fourth street.

whereas. It appears by the petition and affidavit on file in the council chamber of the council of the borough of Reynoldsville, that a majority of property owners, in interest and number, abutting on the line of Hill street, on the line of the proposed improvement, abutting on the line of Hill street, on the line of the proposed improvement, have petitioned the council of said bor-ough to lay out, construct and build a public sewer in Hill street in said bor-ough, beginning at a point on an alley at or near the estate of James Flynn, deceased, where Hill street intersects with said alley; thence in Hill street east to a point where said street inter-sects with Fourth street; thence in Hill street east to a point where said sewer sects with Fourth street; thence in Hill street east to a point where said sewer will connect with a proposed main sew-er at or near where Hill street inter-sects with Fourth street in manner and sects with Fourth street in manner and form as directed by law, that said sewer is a public necessity for the convenience and health of the citizens; and that the costs and expenses of the same be assessed and collected in accordance with the provisions of the Acts of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania relating thereto and regulating the same; therefore

Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the town council of the borough of Reynoldsville in council assembled and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of the same, that a public sewer be laid out, constructed and built in Hill street, beginning at a point on an alley at or near the estate of James Flynn, deceased, where Hill street intersects with said alley; thence in Hill street east to a point where said street intersects with Fourth street; thence in Hill street east to a point where said sewer will connect with a proposed main sewer at or near where Hill street intersects with Fourth street, in accordance with a survey hereto attached and Section 1. Be it ordained and enactance with a survey hereto attached and made a part of this ordinance.

Section 2. That said sewer shall be built as follows: Diameter of sewer pipe to be decided upon by the council; to be placed not less than three (3) feet below the surface of the present street, so that connections with the same can be properly made from cellars six (6) be properly made from cellars six (6) feet in depth reckoning from level of center of street. The Sewer Committee of the town council of the borough of Reynoldsville be and is hereby authorized and empowered to proceed to buy materials, employ an engineer and laborers and make all necessary contracts for the laying out, construction and completion of said sewer.

Section 3. That said sewer shall be subject to all the rules, regulations and ordinances of the borough of Reynoldsville now in force or that may be here-after passed regulating such sewer, and sewer system of said borough, and no person shall be permitted to tap such sewer or connect therewith until such person or owner of property has paid his or her proportion of the costs of the construction of said sewer and complied with all the rules and regulations as




