

# ORDINANCES

Enacted by the Town Council of the Borough of Reynoldsville, Pa.

(No. 60.)

BE IT ORDAINED and enacted by the town council of the Borough of Reynoldsville, in council assembled, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of the same:

Section 1. That the provisions of ordinance No. 51 be and are hereby applied and extended to such portions of said Gordon alley as lies between 6th street and 7th, or Ross street, a majority in interest and number of property owners abutting on the line of said proposed improvement having presented a petition, therefore, in accordance with the Act of Assembly regulating sewers, &c.

Section 2. That any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting with this ordinance is hereby repealed, so far as the same effects this ordinance.

(No. 61.)

BE IT ORDAINED and enacted by the town council of the Borough of Reynoldsville, in council assembled, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same:

Section 1. That the right of way is hereby granted to E. A. Ferrin, his heirs, successors or assigns to enter upon the public streets, lanes, alleys and public squares of the Borough of Reynoldsville, to erect, maintain and control poles and wires for the purpose of carrying and conducting electricity, for the period of fifty years, through said streets, lanes, alleys and public squares of the said Borough of Reynoldsville as they now exist, or may be hereafter changed, extended or established, for the purpose of supplying electricity to the citizens and inhabitants of the Borough of Reynoldsville, and for the lighting of the stores, offices, dwelling houses, streets, lanes, alleys, public squares and other places where electric lights may be needed and desired, and for the supplying of electricity for motor power, or for heat to such person or persons as may desire the same.

Section 2. Said poles shall be erected on the streets, lanes, alleys and public squares at such places and on such lines as the Street Committee of the said Borough shall direct, and the poles shall be straight and of sufficient strength to carry all wires placed thereon, and shall not be less than twenty-five feet in height above the streets.

Section 3. The said E. A. Ferrin, his successors or assigns, shall within ninety days after this Ordinance goes into effect, commence to erect such lines and prosecute said work with reasonable diligence until said plant is completed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall not go into effect until the said E. A. Ferrin, his successors or assigns shall file the stipulation accepting the same with all its provisions, and agreeing to be bound thereby. Said acceptance to be filed within ten days of this ordinance to be null and void.

Section 5. That any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting with this ordinance is hereby repealed so far as the same effects this ordinance.

(No. 62.)

WHEREAS, the Borough of Reynoldsville at a public election held in the said Borough on the 15th day of September, 1888, submitted to the voters of the said Borough the question of voting for public taxes for the furnishing of water and for the lighting of the streets, lanes and alleys of the said Borough of Reynoldsville, and for the furnishing of water, etc., and whereas, the said Borough of Reynoldsville has not yet entered into any contract for the furnishing of lights for the lighting of the streets, lanes, and public squares of the said Borough.

Therefore, be it ordained by the town council of the Borough of Reynoldsville, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same:

Section 1. That the said Borough hire from E. A. Ferrin, his heirs, successors or assigns, Arc Lights to be of not less than 2000 candle power, to be kept burning during each and every night during the period of this contract, to be located at such points or points as the Light Committee of the town council may direct, which said lights during the continuance of this ordinance shall be kept and maintained by the said E. A. Ferrin, his successors or assigns, for the period of ten years from the date at which said light is turned on. In consideration for which the said Borough of Reynoldsville will pay to the said E. A. Ferrin, his heirs or assigns, the sum of Sixty (\$60) dollars per annum for each and every Arc Light so kept and maintained. Said sum to be paid quarterly on the first days of January, April, July and October of each and every year during the aforesaid period of ten years. Proper deductions and allowances shall be made by the said E. A. Ferrin, his successors or assigns, for any light or lights that do not burn the required length of time. Said deductions and allowances to be determined for each quarter, before the light bill is paid. The said E. A. Ferrin, his successors or assigns, shall erect said lights within six months from this date and have the current ready to turn on within six months from this date. The said Borough of Reynoldsville will keep and maintain the aforesaid number of lights during the said term of ten years and for each additional light attached during the said term, the said Borough shall not pay more than the sum herein stipulated to be paid for Arc lights during the continuance of this contract.

Section 2. The Borough of Reynoldsville will annually hereafter levy and collect from its inhabitants a tax for the purpose of paying for said Arc lights as now provided by law.

Section 3. Should the said E. A. Ferrin, his successors or assigns, fail to accept this ordinance and be bound by the terms and conditions thereof within sixty (60) days from the date hereof, or fail to erect and operate said Arc lights within the time prescribed in this ordinance, then this ordinance shall become void, and the Borough of Reynoldsville shall be released from all liability thereunder.

Section 4. That any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting with this ordinance is hereby repealed, so far as the same effects this ordinance.

No. 63.

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the laying out, construction and building of a public sewer in Hill street from an alley at or near the estate of James Flynn, deceased, where said street intersects with said alley to a point where said sewer will connect with a proposed main sewer at or near where Hill street intersects with Fourth street.

Whereas, It appears by the petition and affidavit on file in the council chamber of the council of the Borough of Reynoldsville, that a majority of property owners, in interest and number, abutting on the line of Hill street, on the line of the proposed improvement, have petitioned the council of said Borough to lay out, construct and build a public sewer in Hill street in said Borough, beginning at a point on an alley at or near the estate of James Flynn, deceased, where Hill street intersects with said alley; thence in Hill street east to a point where said street intersects with Fourth street; thence in Hill street east to a point where said sewer will connect with a proposed main sewer at or near where Hill street intersects with Fourth street, in accordance with the provisions of the Acts of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania relating thereto and regulating the same; therefore

Section 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the town council of the Borough of Reynoldsville in council assembled and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of the same, that a public sewer be laid out, constructed and built in Hill street, beginning at a point on an alley at or near the estate of James Flynn, deceased, where Hill street intersects with said alley; thence in Hill street east to a point where said sewer will connect with a proposed main sewer at or near where Hill street intersects with Fourth street, in accordance with a survey hereto attached and made a part of this ordinance.

Section 2. That said sewer shall be built as follows: Diameter of sewer pipe to be decided upon by the council; to be placed not less than three (3) feet below the surface of the present street, so that connections with the same can be properly made from cellars six (6) feet in depth reckoning from level of center of street. The Sewer Committee of the town council of the Borough of Reynoldsville be and is hereby authorized and empowered to proceed to buy materials, employ an engineer and laborers and make all necessary contracts for the laying out, construction and completion of said sewer.

Section 3. That said sewer shall be subject to all the rules, regulations and ordinances of the Borough of Reynoldsville now in force or that may be hereafter passed regulating such sewer, and sewer system of said Borough, and no person shall be permitted to tap such sewer or connect therewith until such person or owner of property has paid his or her proportion of the costs of the construction of said sewer and complied with all the rules and regulations as aforesaid.

Section 4. The costs and expenses of the same to be assessed and collected in accordance with the provisions of the Acts of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania relating thereto and regulating the same.

Section 5. That any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance be and the same is hereby repealed so far as the same effects this ordinance.
