

REVIEW OF TRADE.

Inflated Capitalization Has Caused a Ocoline of Stocks.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade reports as follows for last week: Unusual depression in stocks this week has displayed the great divergence between the trading and the productive industries of the country and its specu-lation. Never has production been greater, the number of hands employed larger, the wages distributed higher or the purchasing power, based upon or the purchasing power, based upon earnings, greater than at this time, and never have conditions of trade or renever have conditions of trade or re-turns of earnings and traffic given cer-tainly of greater business for transport-ers. Yet as the earnings of the railway and manufacturing companies mount upward their stocks decline as if it were disastrous for a road to double its earn-ings and ruinous for a mill to realize unprecedented profits

unprecedented profits.
Inflated capitalization has, of course, done much harm, and speculative ex-citement has counted profits in many cases long before they were earned. Money markets here and abroad have been strained by British reverses in South Africa, and wherever they were overloaded have been pushed to quick and disastrous instead of gradual liqui-dation. The result is that while indus-tries and transporting companies realize tries and transporting companies realize great profits, the speculative holders of

their stocks realize severe losses, Iron production still expands. A Pittsburg com-pany bought 40,000 tons Bessemer for \$24 at Valley mills, which is below re-

cent prices, and Grey Forge is quoted a shade lower at \$21. The boot and shoe works are hastening deliveries to meet the enormous demand and have shipped from Boston 166,421 cash in two weeks of December, against 152,668 last year, and still less in against 152.668 last year, and still less in any other year, except 1897, when 191,-824 cash were shipped. The same deal-ers who urge early deliveries on past or-ders at lower prices are slow to place more at the higher prices now asked, while most of the works, having orders for some time ahead, are not anxious to take more at present. The movement of wheat is disappointing, but prices have declined only 3-8 cent, with corn a fraction higher. Atlantic exports of wheat, flour included, have been in the two weeks of December only 5,328,269 bushels, against 11,-129,459 last year, and Pacific exports 1,501,982 bushels against 1,298,514 last year. Shrinkage in Western receipts, only 8,975,725 bushels having come forward in two weeks, against 17,748,411 ward in two weeks, against 17,748,411 last year, is remarkable, though the

SCENERY

Now Painted Upon Tough Brown Paper for Portability.

Except as regards the part that mechanism plays, the scenic artists of Italy are the best in the world, as effective painters, and the fact is so well recognized in these days of almost all scenery being done by contract-a res-Gent scenic artist is getting to be a rarity-that a great trade of this sort has sprung up between the painters of and the managers everywhere. And this is particularly so as regards companies that come to America. So heavy has been the cost of transporting tons of scenery, and so exacting have the customs officials been of late years, that the generality of managers at one time found it cheaper to have new scenes painted after they arrived. But the Italian system has largely done away with all this, for it includes the painting of the scenery on large sheets of a peculiarly tough sort of brown paper, these being numbered and joined together with unerring accuracy. A recent grand opera production in this country depended scenically upon these sheets of paper alone, and not even the oldest playgoer in the house could distinguish any peculiarity. Of course, the sheets spread upon canvas in the ordinary way, and a "toucher-up" is required after they are spread, but the system is imenseful useful when a new production is taken from one capital to another at a great distance, and the Italian artists are sending their sheets to managers all over the world.

FARM TOPICS

Roots For Pigs.

In some Danish experiments to determine the value of rutabagas, turnips and mangelwurzels as feed for hogs it was shown that these roots may be fed as a part of a pig's ration with satisfactory results. The feed-ing value of roots was shown to correspond very nearly with their dry matter content. Roots rich in sugar produced better results than those light in sugar. The increase in live weight, however, followed more close ly the dry matter content than the sugar of the roots. The hogs were fed a ration which contained three-fourths grain and one-fourth roots. In addi-tion the pigs received buttermilk, skimmilk and whey either alone or

A Corduroy Farm Road. The chronically wet spots in the farm roads can be well treated by the plan shown in the illustration. Such a device was seen in successful use



this season. Split cedar or pine logs in two and lay them, sawed side up, on the wet ground, as shown. Two strips of board can be laid down lengthwise on each side and nailed to the slabs to hold them in place, or iron "dogs" can be used. The diagram A B shows how to saw the logs for such a corduroy road .- American Agriculturist.

Rat Proof Crib.

A farmer who had been tormented with rats in the corn crib has out witted the cunning rodents by simply covering the outside of his corncrib with heavy g-inch mesh wire netting from below the floor to the roof. If the doors are kept shut, the corn will come out in the spring as bright and clean as it went in the fall previous. If I were to build another crib, however, I would nail the wire on the inside of the crib and use no side boarding at all, but fasten with staples the wire to 2x4 posts set edgewise twelve or fourteen inches apart. This would save the expense of sliding and allow air to circulate through the crib.

Dimensions of the crib would be three to three and one-half feet in width at the bottom and both sides to slant outward and upward at an angle of about sevenly degrees, the tops of the posts to be strongly nailed to the rafters whether the roof is to be of a single or double slant. The ends of the crib must be made tight with a tight-fitting door or doors, which must of course always be closed when no one is around the crib. The crib should be eighteen inches or two feet from the ground. As an extra precaution the wire netting may be put between the two thicknesses of floor boards, but if properly built, that would probably be unnecessary. The crib should be at least six feet high between floor and roof. Such a crib would last a life-time and not a bushel of corn would be destroyed, provided the enemy was not introduced in loads of corn hauled from the field or from other carelessness. -Orange Jul Farmer.

Water For Cows.

A great deal of disappointment in dairying in the winter season often arises from the fact that the cows are not properly supplied with water. Few farmers realize the amount of water necessary for a cow in full milk in the winter season. The amount, of course, depends on the kind of feed. Where roots are fed for ensilage, the amount of water required is considerably lessened because they have a considerable amount of water in the supply of feed. At the Copenhagen station it was found that 76 cows required an average of 97.9 pounds of water per day, or about 12 gallons each. At the Pennsylvania station it was found that cows averaging 773 pounds in weight, confined in stalls in the summer and living on fresh grass, drank 61 pounds each per day, while confined in stalls at a temperature of 73 degrees, and fed on dry grass they drank 107 pounds. In general, according to Professor Henry, cows require about four pounds, or a half gallon of water to each pound of dry matter in the feed, and Sturtevant, of New York, says that provision should be made for eight gallons a day per cow in order to be sure of a full supply.

At the Geneva station it was found that cows in full milk required about four and three-fifths pounds of water for every pound of milk. It follows, therefore, that the heavier the milker the larger amount of water is necessary. As to whether the water should be warm or hot is a somewhat mooted question. We doubt the propriety of heating water for cows when it can be furnished at about the temperature of well water in winter. The tank heater serves an admirable purpose when the water is exposed to a zero temperature. Wolf, of the Indiana station, found by experiment, that there was a dropping off of 8 percent, when the temperature fell from 79 Fahrenheit to 38. It will, therefore, be seen that the water supply is a very important matter in connection with profit in dairying, and we make the suggestion at this time of year be-cause we suspect that no little disappointment in winter dairying arises out of the fact that farmers overlook a really very important matter.—Farm, Field and Fireside.



If silverware is kept clean it does not often have to be polished. After using the silver it should always be washed with a suds, made by dissolving some shavings of Ivory Soap in warm water, then wiped dry and rubbed lightly with a soft paper, a chamois skin or a piece of flannel.

All highly-polished metal surfaces will retain their polish much longer if this plan is followed and rubbing with compounds avoided as much as possible.
