Advice From "Justice,"
REYNOLDSVILLE, PA., Apr. 23, 1900.
EDITOR OF THE STAR:—The writer of this has formed the acquaintance of many good people among our neighboring farming community. The people are industrious, hard working and respectable citizens. Though their intelligence in matters pertaining to their avocation cannot be questioned, they need—so the writer thinks—some information as to one matter quite a number of them do not seem to have fully weighed or grasped. There are, as the writer's observation has taught him, too many catalogues of mail order business houses in evidence among them. There are also found with them too many articles purchased from these houses; articles they could have purchased of merchants at their very doors, at Reynoldsville and elsewhere. Now our worthy farmers in doing this overlook certain matters to their detriment. By purchasing at Chicago or elsewhere, they minimize the trade of home merchants. It may be true that some of these dealers cannot sell at the figures quoted by these bargain houses. But as a rule their goods are of a better quality. Again if the money of a farming community goes to other places instead of into the drawers of the home merchants, these farmers lessen the purchasing ability of their home merchants. These latter will have to economize in proportion as they lose trade in the manner described. They must of necessity purchase fewer turkeys, horses, produce and other things raised by the farmer. They also become less able to extend credit to their farmer friends when these are in a "pinch." "Sams, Gunlock & Co.," or any other bargain house demand cash or C. O. D. payments. Now then as there is an interdependency not only between the farmer and the home merchant but also among the laboring man and mechanic and the home merchant these good people should not pass them over and send for sewing machines, guns, organs, carpets, vehicles, etc., elsewhere. Boom—boom home trade all you can. Put your money in circulation among the family of your own community and every member of that community will prosper and every farmer and mechanic and laborer will be benefitted. If, perhaps, some articles purchased from a distance are cheaper than those offered for sale by home merchants, every pur-

chaser can see and examine what they are receiving. He or she will not get a "gold brick." By giving the home dealers all the trade you can, you are instrumental in increasing their ability to cheapen prices.
The writer of this is no merchant and he is not instigated by merchants to write these lines. But as he is seeking "the peace of the city" and community he desires to see all work for the benefit of the same. JUSTICE.
