Ordinances.

(No. 20.) AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 6 of Ordinance entitled "No. 3, Relating to the adoption and regulation of streets, alleys and sidewalks, approved and to take effect on and after March 1st, 1894."

Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of West Reynoldsville, Pa., that the following Ordinance be and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same:

Section 6. That section 6th of an Ordinance entitled "No. 3, Relating to the adoption and regulation of streets, alleys and sidewalks, approved, and to take effect on and after March 1st, 1894, which reads as follows: 'Section 6. That all plank walks on Main street from the creek on line adjoining Reynoldsville Borough west to Broadway street, shall be five feet wide, thence to Brown street, shall be five feet four inches in width, thence to west line of the borough, four feet wide, and on Broadway street sidewalks shall be five feet and four inches wide, and on all other streets shall be four feet in width; the said sidewalks to have an inclination of one-fourth of an inch to the foot towards the street. The plank not to be less than two inches in thickness, and shall be laid crosswise, and well spiked upon three sound stringers to be not less than 2 1/2 inches, said stringers to be so laid as to break joints, and at every joint of the stringer they shall be attached together by having a coupling board one inch thick and three feet long, same width as stringer, well spiked to each end on the inside of the outside stringers. The said stringers to be placed upon stone or timber foundations or supports, at a distance of every five and one-third feet, sufficient to keep each line of stringers of a grade, and the two outside lines of stringers to be not more than two inches from the end of the plank, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Section 6. That all plank walks on Main street from the creek on line adjoining Reynoldsville Borough, west to Broadway street shall be six feet wide, thence to Brown street shall be five feet four inches in width, thence to west line of the borough, four feet wide, and on Broadway street and the western side of First Avenue, sidewalks shall be five feet four inches in width, and on all other streets shall be four feet in width; the said sidewalks to have an inclination of one-fourth of an inch to the foot toward the street. The plank not to be less than two inches in thickness, and shall be laid crosswise, and well spiked upon three sound stringers, to be not less than 2 1/2 inches, said stringers to be so laid as to break joints, and at every joint of the outside stringer they shall be attached together by having a coupling board one inch thick and three feet long, same width as stringer, well spiked to each end on the inside of each of the outside lines of the stringers. The said stringers to be placed upon stone or timber foundations or supports, at a distance of every five and one-third feet, sufficient to keep each line of stringers of a grade, and the two outside lines of stringers to be not more than two inches from the end of the plank.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

(No. 21.) TO EMPOWER the proper officers of the borough of West Reynoldsville to make a contract with the Reynoldsville Water Company to furnish and maintain fire plugs and hydrants and supply the borough with sufficient water for the extinguishment of fires and other public purposes, and to levy and collect a special annual tax to pay the expense thereof.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of West Reynoldsville, Pa., that the following Ordinance be and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same: That the borough of West Reynoldsville, by its proper officers, make and enter into a contract with the Reynoldsville Water Company, to furnish and maintain fire plugs or hydrants and to supply the said borough with a sufficient supply of water for the extinguishment of fires and other public purposes.

Section 2. That a special annual tax be levied and collected not to exceed eight mills on each dollar of valuation of the said borough to defray the expenses of the said fire plugs and hydrants, and the tax so collected shall not be used for any other or different purpose.
